Written a century and a half after the death of Francis of Assisi, the text is not regarded as an important primary source for the saint's biography, but it was the most popular account of his life and relates many colorful anecdotes, miracles and pious examples from the life of Francis and his early followers. It is considered a masterpiece of Italian literature and a masterful work of the Middle Ages. Construction of the Hotel Lankershim began in 1902 and completed in 1905 with nine stories, 200 servants, 250 rooms, and 160 baths. The hotel was designed by Robert B. Young for Col. J. B. Lankershim, son of Bavarian-born landowner Isaac Landershim. It was built to imitate the Hotel S. Francis in San Francisco, a claim that LA boosters repeated with each new hotel that represented an improvement over the last. It was soon eclipsed by the Rosslyn as the rival of the St. Francis. Robert Moses was known as the "master builder" of mid-twentieth-century New York City, Long Island, Rockland County, and Westchester County. He is also one of the most polarizing figures in the history of urban development in the United States. His decisions favoring highways over public transit helped create the modern suburbs of Long Island and influenced a generation of engineers, architects and urban planners who spread his philosophies across the United States. Moses was never elected to public office, but was responsible for the creation and leadership of numerous public authorities which he could control without having to answer to the general public or to elected officials. In this letter he writes as Chairman of the Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority, which is an affiliate agency of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority that operates seven intrastate toll bridges and two tunnels in New York City. In terms of traffic volume, it is the largest bridge and tunnel toll agency in the United states, serving more than a million people each day and generating more than \$1.5 billion in toll revenue annually as of 2012. In this letter to James W. Danahy, Executive Vice President of the West Side Association of Commerce, Moses indicates that the City Planning Commission set April 17, 1963 as the date for a public hearing on the removal of the Lower Manhattan Expressway from the city map, and points out that Danahy should attend the meeting and "prepare an expression of your position on this subject for the public hearing."

FIRST EDITION of this playlet written and staged by Kate B. Palmer at a dinner given at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Palmer for some of Mr. Palmer's Bohemian friends on 11 September, 1913. W. S. Palmer arranged for their publication by the Philopolix Press of San Francisco without informing Kate Palmer. The Philopolis Press was affiliated with the California Arts and Crafts movement and was established by Arthur Frank Mathews (1860-1945). Mathews was an American Tonalist painter who was trained as an architect and artist. After the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire, Mathews opened the Philopolis Press and published the monthly *Philopolis* magazine, which promoted Arts and Crafts aesthetics in the rebuilding of the city. His press was in operation from 1907 to 1918. W. S. Palmer was a member of the Bohemian Club, serving as President in 1920. It is not known, and perhaps doubtful, that this particular piece was directly associated with the Bohemian Club, but likely a formal gathering of friends of like interest in a private residence. Kate B. Palmer was at one time the Principal of the Fruitvale Grammar School, Oakland, CA (prior to 1907) and was a teacher of young children in the Oakland public schools. She published a number of books, including Twelve Songs for Kindergarten and Primary Schools (London: Ginn 7 Company, 1905) which was adopted as a textbook in the Oakland school district in 1905. The text in The Spirit of Woman in Bohemia incorporates some of the themes of the teachings in Kate Palmer's early school book, portraying women as

embodying the social virtues the *Twelve Songs* sought to instill in children, but strangely portraying women pleading for grace from male characters. The text interestingly references to important historical characters of the turn of the nineteenth to the twentieth centuries, including the Modern Woman character "gowned like Nell Brinckley (1886-1944, American illustrator and comic artists, the "Queen of Comics"), muchly bejewelled," and John Vance Cheney (1848-1922, American poet, essayist, and librarian who was librarian of the Free Public Library of San Francisco before he moved to Chicago in 1891 where he was librarian of the Newberry Library. (long known as the managers of Boston and California Excursions), in the interest of their work, and to aid people in obtaining reliable information about California; also, to assist first-class people to obtain a cheap and comfortable trip to California. In placing our Annual List of Excursions before the public, we would say, as we are the oldest Company organizing this kind of Excursions, our motto is still 'Excelsior.'" 2 copies of Phillips *Annual Guide* sold at the Dawson auction in 2007; \$2,500.00; \$3,400.00. It seems that each year Phillips contracted with a different publisher; this is the H. S. Crocker imprint; California State Library confirmed this as the 1887 issue. Worldcat records 2 copies of the H. S. Crocker issue of the *Annual*, Huntington Library and the Wisconsin Historical Society.

FIRST EDITION. This is the first in a series of *Annual Reports* produced for the Central Pacific Railroad Company. It includes the statement of Leland Stanford, President, the General Superintendent's Report by A. N. Towne, the Secretary's Report by E. H. Miller, Jr., and the Chief Engineer's Report by S. S. Montague. The Central Pacific Railroad is the former name of the railroad network built between California and Utah that formed part of the "First Transcontinental Railroad" in North America. It is now part of the Union Pacific Railroad. The Central Pacific Railroad was authorized by Congress in 1862; it was financed and built through "The Big Four": Sacramento, California businessmen Leland Stanford, Collis Huntington, Charles Crocker, and Mark Hopkins. The "Golden Spike" connecting the western railroad to the Union Pacific Railroad at Promontory, Utah, was hammered on May

10, 1869. Coast-to-coast train travel in eight days became possible, replacing monthslong sea voyages and lengthy, hazardous travel by wagon trains.
