LIMITED EDITION of 250 numbered copies, this number 84, handset and printed by Jack Werner Stauffacher using original seventeenth-century Baroque types cut by the Hungarian punch-cutter Nicholas Kis in Amsterdam, 1686, on French Rives mould-made paper and printed on a Swiss Gietz Platen Press. For more than five hundred years, Cicero has been printed in many editions and his presence in the history of printing is significant. In many seventeenth- and eighteenth-century type specimen books, Cicero plays an important role in the display of the many point sizes. Since the rediscovery of classical literature during the Renaissance, Cicero was the favorite writer and model of Latin teaching. His *De Oratore* was the first book printed in Italy, at Subiaco near Rome, in 1465. Joannes de Spria in 1469 printed the first book in Venice, the *Epistole ad familiares*. A year later Nicolaus Jenson printed, also in Venice, the *Rhetorica nova et vetus*, in his famous roman types. In 1744 Benjamin Franklin published *Cato Major (de senectute)* in his newly purchased Caslon type. It was the first Latin classic to be printed in British America. Montaigne writes that Cicero “gives one an appetite for growing old.” All good reasons for the Greenwood Press to issue an edition of Cicero’s *Cato the Elder on old age*.

LIMITED EDITION of 36 copies, this is number 17, with William Rueter's calligraphy reproduced in polymer plates and printed by Rollin Milroy on a variety of papers on a hand press, and then each sheet subsequently hand-embellished with calligraphic elements by William Rueter, thus every leaf includes original handiwork by Rueter, uniformly hand-bound by Claudia Cohen. This book contains 18 aphorisms on the theme of books anthologized by Will Rueter, proprietor of the The Aliquando Press. The project is a collaboration between Heavenly Monkey and the Aliquando Press, exploiting Rueter's avocation in calligraphy. Rueter selected, designed, and wrote out each aphorism to fill a page; some elements were omitted, and Rueter then added the elements to each sheet by hand. Authors quoted in the collection are Helen Keller, Bohuslav Martinu, Stephan Zweig, Anonymous, George Santayana, William Morris, Martin Luther, Richard Rodriguez, Paul Auster, T. J. Cobden-Sanderson, Raul Mario Rosarivo, Rabbi Nachman, Joseph Conrad, Herman Koch, John Rushkin, William Blake, Francesco Petrarca, and Tertullian. 3 of the aphorisms are on fold-out sheets printed by Reuter in Ontario while the rest of the book was printed at Heavenly Monkey with a hand press. The Aliquando Press is a small press owned and operated by William Rueter; it has published more than 100 books, which experiment freely with book design, calligraphy, hand-setting type, printing, and book binding. Rueter was awarded the Robert R. Reid Award for lifetime achievement or extraordinary contributions to the book arts in Canada by the Alcuin Society in 2013.

FIRST EDITION. This little book of poetry is interesting from two points of view; it highlights the literary work of Nora Chesson and weds her poetry with an important English publishing house. Raphael Tuck & Sons began in London in October 1866, started by Raphael Tuck and his wife, Ernestine. Their main line of business included pictures, greeting cards, and postcards, their most successful line. Three of the couple's four sons participated in the business with the second son, Adolph, becoming chairman and managing direct from 1870-1926. The firm ran postcard and poetry competitions through the early 1900s. Nora Chesson won such a competition for poetry in 1894 (see the Introduction). This book has a colorful frontispiece and also a color illustrated label on the front cover. Through his publishing business, Raphael Tuck, a native of Prussia, opened up new fields of labor for artists, lithographers, engravers, printers, ink and paste board makers, and several other types of trades. This volume is from the *Crystal Thoughts From the Poets* Series which includes anthologies of the work of Shakespeare, Tennyson, Longfellow, Burns and Adelaide Procter. "Nora Chesson was an English journalist and poet. She won for herself a distinct celebrity as a contributor to most the English periodicals and newspapers of her time. Eleanor Jane Hopper was born in Exeter, 2 January 1871. Her father, Capt. Harman Baillie Hopper, was Irish. She was a participant in the Irish Literary movement of the 1890s, having some influence on W. B. Yeats in particular with her *Ballads in Prose* (1894). Her career as an authoress in poetry and in prose began in 1887, when she was not quite seventeen years of age, and she went on increasing her literary reputation until her death. In 1901, she married the English man of letters Wilfred Hugh Chesson (1870-1953). She died 14 April 1906." Wikipedia.

LIMITED EDITION of 50 copies printed in Eric Gill's Joanna type on an Albion hand press by the students of "The Art of the Book" course taught by Saul Marks at the Press of the Department of Fine Arts, University of Southern California during the terms of 1961-62. This is an elusive item that rarely makes it into the market. With the unmistakable taste and design talent of the course instructor, Saul Marks, in strong evidence. An elegant publication distributed mainly to the students of the course, and close friends and associates, including Glen Dawson and Wallace Nethery (whose copy inscribed by Saul Marks we handled in 2010).

The students working on this project were Charles Atkinson, Hedwig Brenner, Lawrence Deutsch, Laurence Hines, Andrew Horn, Allen Lawson, Tom Ohmer, and Jim Walker. The list of students is an interesting group, including several professionals well-on in their careers. One such was Andrew Horn (1914-1983), librarian, educator, administrator, printer, bibliographer, and historian. In 1959 Horn returned to UCLA from Occidental College to help Lawrence Clark Powell organize a School of Library Service. Horn was instrumental in planning curricula and hiring outstanding faculty for the new school, which opened in the fall of 1960, and where Horn served as professor and Assistant Dean. Upon Powell's retirement in 1966, Horn became Dean of the Library School until 1975, and continued as Dean Emeritus until 1978; he taught classes in the library school until his death in 1983. The Horn Press at UCLA is named after Andrew Horn. Worldcat records 4 copies, as in 2010: USC, UCLA, Occidental College, and the Library of Congress. LIMITED EDITION, of 150 numbered copies, this is number 136, printed with hand-set Lutetia types by Edmund Thompson and printed by the Walpole Printing Office on French Vidalon handmade paper including border printed in red adapted from one by William Morris. The monograph puts the Kelmscott Chaucer into its historical context along with its impact, particularly in its virtues and vices as a piece of printing craftsmanship. A reprint of Chaucer's poetry was one of William Morris's first goals for the Kelmscott Press, and one of the last books printed at Kelmscott Press, reflecting the care and devotion invested by William Morris in his craft. This is the story of how, on countless visits for more than twenty years, the great oak has become a cherished and prominent presence in my daily life. I have experienced the old tree as its leaves undergo seasonal changes and finally drop to cover the ground. I have watched season after season as spring flowers give way to plump acorns. Beside the imposing tree, just outside its broad canopy, vulnerable seedlings have appeared and grown into sturdy saplings.” Rebecca Chamlee. The acorn included in the deluxe box has been frozen for 12 months, baked for 8 hours, and sealed.

LIMITED EDITION of 120 copies, this is copy number 115. This is a scarce item highlighting the hand-crafting of paper throughout various regions of Japan. It was issued by the Sapporo City Folk Art Shop. My cataloging is dependent upon the small slip of paper laid into the book. I could find no Worldcat record of this title, and no online record of the book. Nor of the Sapporo City Folk Art Shop. This cataloger speculates that this item was gathered on a book fair trip or recreational visit of Glen Dawson, perhaps in the 1970s, to Japan, and that the visit involved some sightseeing. I would guess that the Sapporo City Folk Art Shop was an institution that passed out of existence pre-internet. The accompanying slip notes an affiliated Japanese institution as Kaizawa Some Iro Kenkyo Jo - Kaizawa Paper Dyeing Research Institute, about which I am not finding any online records. The woodcut illustration represents parasols with paper canopies executed by Junichiro Sekino (1914-1988), who was a Japanese woodblock printer, one of the major postwar artists of the *sosaku hanga* movement (See Wikipedia). Perhaps one might describe this book as a tourist's souvenir, but it is valuable for the variety of paper samples included and for the writing it contains about the producers and techniques of the respective paper-makers this small volume documents. Bradbury writes that E. Helene Sherman, of Watertown, MA, "illustrated several miniature books for REM Miniatures and Kurbel Books.... Her miniature illuminated manuscripts ... were issued in small numbers and the estimated numbers of copies are from Robert E. Massmann's article on Sherman that appeared in *The Newsletter of the International Miniature Book Society* in 1985. She also created unique miniature manuscripts for various collectors.... Massmann ... bound all of Sherman's miniature manuscript volumes." In Bradbury's bibliography, Bradbury notes the date for *Pearls of Wisdom* as 1964 and bound in illuminated cloth boards. The binding on the copy offered here is not cloth. Dawson's Catalogue 497 (1989) describes the Raymond Smith copy of this title as bound in vellum, but I have consulted with a miniature book connoisseur and 2 book-binder/conservationists, and our consensus is that this copy is bound in some type of stiff paper.
